
OUR "NEW" REMAINS EXCITING

The online services, the drive-thru missions, the utilization of outdoor space, and the embracing of new thinking in order to grow in effective ministry. While it may not be easy, and we may not be uncomfortable with this "newness," it is something that is likely to stay as a part



of our regular ministries and events in the future.

God is providing us many opportunities of hope and prosperity. God continues to bless us with new thoughts, new people, and new tools to grow as disciples of Christ. As we end this season after the Epiphany, and begin our Lenten journey to Easter, we enter into a new season of spiritual reflection and growth. It is a season to reflect on how our journey has transpired, reflect on the pain and hardships, reflect on how God's hand remains in our midst, and to rededicate ourselves to the journey ahead.

This Lenten Season, let us again recommit ourselves and our lives to Christ and faithfully serve and give. Let us journey together in faith as we approach the cross, recognizing that through the life, death and resurrection of Christ, we are invited to share the Easter story with all.
